Dear Mr Snyder,

Here I am again. As yet I have not got back to my family in Belgium. As a matter of fact since last I wrote to you, I have undergone a very serious operation. I was discharged from the hospital some 15 days ago. Although still rather weakly, I am going on fine, but all this is neither here nor there. Let us come down to facts.

I do not know exactly what is happening in Belgium today, but I do know that in the general clearing up of their domestic (interior) affairs, such a number of queer stories are being told. This has come about because the American & British Com. Coms are making an intensive enquiry into the execution of aid offered to their subjects during the time that Belgium was occupied by the enemy. From what I can judge, I gather that the Com. Coms have asked my wife to contact as many people as possible, of whom ever she has any remembrance, whether their cases interest

of personal aid. My wife would know if you will
show to kind enough to make an allegation to the effect
that it was her who first placed you in contact with
Mr Marshall. That it was also her who placed you with
the Buyle family as also that she (my wife) managed to
obtain for you, a civilian suit.

I should have preferred not writing to you on this
subject. With my wife not I have anything to gain
by it. Still, as the Allied Commission have asked for help,
they have their own reasons, and I have no choice.

Wishing that you are in the best of health & that you are
now settled down to civilian life, as a man.
