RATIONING WATER

City water use down 7 percent

The City of Seal Beach reports that residents are using measurably less water since the city declared a Phase I Water Shortage Emergency and imposed restrictions that began Aug. 12. The measures are in response to the ongoing statewide drought and cutbacks in water supply.

Citywide, residents used 7 percent less water in August than in July, according to Sean Crumby, director of public works.

'We are happy about that," he said. "People really are paying attention.'

On July 15, the State Water Resources Control Board approved an emergency regulation to ensure water agencies, which includes Seal Beach, conserve water in urban settings or face possible fines or other enforcement.

West County Connector

NB 405 on-ramp is closed at night

The northbound I-405 freeway on-ramp at Seal Beach Boulevard reopened last week after a two-month closure.

But the ramp remains closed at night as part of regularly scheduled nightly full freeway closures.

The West County Connectors (WCC) project is a joint partnership between OCTA and Caltrans linking high occupancy vehicle (HOV) lanes/carpool lanes on the I-405 Freeway with those on the Garden Grove Freeway (SR-22) and the San Gabriel River Freeway (I-605).

The purpose is to create a seamless carpool connection among the three freeways.

In other construction news:

•Falsework (temporary bridge supports) removal at the SR-22/I-405 carpool connector was completed last week. This week, crews will install barrier rail along the connector. Installation of electrical and fiber optic lines along the I-405 and SR-22 freeways is ongoing and will be under way through early November.

• Crews have begun falsework removal on the I-405/I-605 carpool connector and the 7th Street/ eastbound SR-22/northbound I-605 connector bridge.

To remove the 120-foot beams, three cranes will work together to lower the beams onto a flatbed truck stationed on the roadway below, so they can be hauled off-site.

•Nightly closures are scheduled through Oct. 11 and will include portions of the SR-22, I-605, I-405 freeways, as well as Old Ranch Parkway and Seal Beach Boulevard.

Unattended pan of oil sparks fire that displaced 2

"Stand by your pan" is the message Orange County Fire Authority Capt. Steve Concialdi wants to get across to Leisure World residents after a fire caused \$120,000 in damage and displaced two residents Oct. 2.

'Stand by your pan,'

says OCFA Capt. Steve Concialdi.

"And make sure smoke alarms are working," he said. That's what saved Building 14 on Fresh Meadow Lane in Mutual 3.

At about 5:30 p.m. on Thursday, a pan of unattended oil in the kitchen of apartment 14-J ignited, activating the smoke alarm. 'The problem is that oil catches fire quickly, then the cabinets

catch fire," Concialdi said. Flames quickly engulfed the apartment.



In her complaint about GRF recreation fees, Ginny Kim mixed up the GRF fee with the overall expense, which includes individual mutual fees, taxes and such. As far as I know, all of us were vetted and informed about the expenses before we moved in. How can Ms. Kim fail to notice? I have a one-bedroom unit and pay \$139 a month for the GRF fee, which is the same as everybody else. Ms Kim's claim of having

to pay four to five times as much is an exaggeration.

Here is the calculation of the stuff Ms. Kimdoesn't want to pay. From the financial report (The News, Oct. 2), the recreation fee (including library, Amphitheater, golf course, swimming pool, and all clubhouses) is \$117,530.68 for the seven months from January to July 2014. Divided by 6,608 units, the recreational cost per unit is \$2.54 a month, a mere 1.8 percent of the GRF fee.

One resident cannot buy all those amenities that cheap. It's all about the economy of scale. All residents contribute, so a variety of services can be for everyone.

If residents can pick and choose what they want to pay, we will have nothing.

What if some residents find our security cumbersome; using Ms. Kim's logic, should they opt out paying for the service?

You open a Pandora's Box, Ms. Kim.



Property tax relief bill for some seniors signed into law

Governor Brown recently signed Assembly Bill (AB) 2231 to reinstate the property tax postponement program (PTP).

PTP is designed to provide tax relief to lowincome seniors and disabled who are unable to pay their property tax bills. This important program was vetoed by the former governor in the Budget Act of 2008.



In a rare display of bipartisanship the measure unanimously cleared both the Senate and Assembly. The program, as it has in the past, gives peace of mind to many Leisure World shareholders.


In 2009, with the full support of the Golden Rain Foundation (GRF), I prepared a formal petition that was signed by a large number of shareholders on a Saturday in Clubhouse 6. It urged the former governor to restore the funding for this long-standing program.

The petition was sent to the former governor and had the support of the State Controller and former Sen. Tom Harman and former Assembly member Jim Silva.

Historically, the PTP was administered by the state controller. To be eligible, people must be 62 or older, make less than \$35,000 a year or be blind or disabled.


Eligible shareholders may begin submitting applications for the PTP to the state controller starting July 1, 2016.

Return borrowed equipment after use

When driving through Leisure World, it's an every day occurrence to see residents out for a stroll or heading to one of the clubhouses using a mobility aids device. In most cases, the walker or wheelchair has been provided gratis, courtesy of the Golden Age Foundation (GAF). The GAF initiated this service in the 1980s, when many shareholders were still trying to decide where they would spend their retirement years.

Each year the GAF loans out an average of 1,200 mobility aids to assist LW residents who are experiencing difficulty ambulating due to health concerns.

Bruce Humes is the current chairman of the Mobility Aids Program, leading a crew of volunteers responsible for setting appointments and making deliveries each week day. One of his priorities this year is to encourage residents to return their borrowed equipment when it is no longer needed.

GAF stickers on the equipment make it easy to identify borrowed equipment. Stickers are on the right side of the wheelchair near the brake, or beneath the seat of the walker. There is also an identifying number on the back of each wheelchair and on the front bar of each walker.

Returning equipment just requires a phone call. Messages may be left at 431-9589. A dispatcher will return the call and make arrangements for the wheelchair or walker to be picked up at a convenient time.

When an actor reaches "star" status, it is for several reasons. For the producer it is the bankability of the star in bringing in the audience. For their peers, a star is an actor who, over a period of time, has completed a body of work to look back on with fondness, and then see that star shine again as often as possible. In the new revival of playwright Horton Foote's "The Trip to Bountiful," there are three stars visible, giving performances to last for a long time in one's memory.

Returning to one's past is a major theme in "The Trip to Bountiful." It is also a conversation often heard here in Leisure World. Fellow LWers return to high school reunions, family reunions and events that take place where they grew up. For some reason, as we get older, there is a need to revisit where we started our life's journey.

The time is 1953. Octogenarian Carrie Watts (Cicely Tyson) is trapped. She lives with her son Ludie (Blair Underwood) and his wife Jessie Mae (Vanessa Williams) in a small apartment in Houston, Texas. We find out that Ludie is working a job that pays less than his previous employment. To make ends meet they need the extra income of Carrie's pension check, which is greedily grabbed by Jessie Mae for trips to the beauty parlor and Coca-Colas.

Carrie needs to escape the overbearing Jessie Mae. Carrie desires to return to the town of her youth: Bountiful, Texas. She admits that it's anything but bountiful, and yet, the memories she has of growing up there are warm and the desire to revisit her youth is overpowering.

Carrie hides her check when it comes. She cleverly finds her way to the bus station. She manages to avoid Ludie and Jessie Mae at the bus station, and Carrie, and the audience, are off on a road trip. Carrie is joined on her journey by fellow traveler Thelma (Jurnee Smallett-Bell), whose husband has been drafted into the Korean War.





Carrie finally reaches Bountiful. The town is deserted. The house she lived in has been abandoned. Ludie and Jessie Mae catch up to Carrie and what ensues is a beautifully written scene where all the loose ends are tied up.

But Carrie has achieved her goal in seeing Bountiful, and she agrees to return to Houston and not cause any more trouble.

The role of Carrie Watts is one of those roles that any actress would give just about anything up to play. Previous portrayals by Lillian Gish and Geraldine Page were praised. Stepping into those large shoes, and more than filling them, is Cicely Tyson (films "Sounder" and "The Autobiography of Miss Jane Pittman"). Returning to the stage after a 30-year absence, one can only hope this is not her last. Tyson will have you laughing and crying.

Vanessa Williams (TV's "Ugly Betty) treads the thin line between villain and coquette, urging the audience to dare to dislike her. Blair Underwood (TV's "L.A. Law") smoothly makes the transition from the henpecked husband to the man of the house. He and Tyson are riveting in the play's most poignant scene between mother and son.

We all at some time feel the need to return to the scenes of our youth. For some it's a strong feeling. For some it's not. For Carrie Watts, she realizes eventually that returning will not change her situation as she had hoped. This is a play for audience members of the age of our LWers. It tackles issues like elderly abuse and the desire of the elderly to feel needed and not abandoned. It is being presented in a production that shines and will have you exiting thinking seriously about your own living situation.

Three "stars" are on view at the Ahmanson, and they are shining brightly.

Cities across the state scrambled to comply with the mandate, which was issued in the face of a drought of historic proportions. In January, Gov. Jerry Brown issued a request for a voluntary 20-percent reduction in water use; no region in the state met that goal.

That precipitated the State Water Resources Control Board's emergency regulation ordering cities to enforce water restrictions.

Seal Beach complied by implementing a Phase 1 Water Supply Shortage Emergency Plan to reduce outdoor urban water use.

Most Californians use more water outdoors than indoors. In some areas, 50 percent or more of daily water use is for lawns and outdoor landscaping.

The key elements of the city's Phase I Water Supply Shortage Emergency Plan allow landscape watering a maximum of three days per week for no more than 15 minutes per sprinkler station. The schedule for Leisure World is as follows:

• Monday night, Tuesday morning: Even-numbered mu-

tuals

•Tuesday night, Wednesday morning: Odd-numbered mutuals

•Wednesday night, Thursday morning: No watering

•Thursday night, Friday morning: Even-numbered mutuals

• Friday night, Saturday morning: Odd-numbered mutuals

•Saturday night, Sunday morning: Even-numbered mutuals

•Sunday night, Monday morning: Odd-numbered mutuals

Landscape watering must be done between the hours of 5 p.m. and 9 a.m. on designated days (see page 24 for a verbatim copy of the letter sent from the city to Leisure World mutuals outlining the mandatory conservation measures).

Other measures include:

• Watering of outdoor landscaping so there is no runoff. This means no water can run off landscape onto the sidewalk, driveway or gutter.

•Water cannot be used to wash down sidewalks, hard or paved surfaces, including walkways, driveways and parking areas. Washing down such surfaces is only allowed to alleviate safety or sanitary hazards. In such cases the use of a hand-held bucket, a hand-held hose equipped with a positive self-closing water shut-off device, or a low-volume high-pressure water broom must be used.

• Washing of vehicles should be kept to a minimum. When washing, a hose fitted with a selfclosing water shut-off device is required.

Leisure World policy bans resident car washing on trust streets. A carwash that uses recycled water is available for residents at Clubhouse 2.

A water inspector hired by the city is visiting mutuals to educate residents on new measures and to help prevent overwatering.

The new water restrictions will remain in effect until at least April 1.

At that time, the state may decide to extend the restrictions if drought conditions persist.

The city is doing its part to reduce water use at public properties.

It has reduced irrigation run times, is conducting audits of irrigation lines and sprinklers, and replacing broken sprinklers.

Aneighbor heard the incessant beeping of the smoke alarm and called the Orange County Fire Authority. Within minutes, about 35 firefighters, including two battalion chiefs, arrived in four engines, two truck companies and a paramedic van. The fire was under control in about 20 minutes, according to Concialdi.

Because of the fast response time, firefighters were able to keep the fire from spreading to adjoining units. Meanwhile Leisure World Security patrol officers and a service maintenance worker evacuated eight people from the eight-unit single-story building. Fire displaced two residents, the occupant of 14-J, where the fire started, and her neighbor in 14-K, according to OCFA and Security reports. The woman in 14-J is living with her niece in Westminster pending extensive repairs. The other displaced person now has limited access, according to Security reports.

The fire caused an estimated \$80,000 to the structure and \$40,000 to its contents. Nearby units had minor smoke damage, Concialdi said.

The OCFA receives an average of one cooking fire call every three days, Concialdi said. Last year, there were 21 cooking fires in November and 17 in December.

People need to stay by the stove while cooking, he said.

"If you need to answer the door or leave the room, just shut off the pan. Because people get sidetracked and they forget, and fire develops."

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



Dear Seal Beach Water Customer,

The State Water Resources Control Board finds that an emergency exists due to severe drought conditions in California.

We seek your cooperation and assistance in meeting the State Regulations for Water Conservation.

In response to the drought and cutbacks in water supply, the City of Seal Beach has declared a **Phase I Water Shortage Emergency**. The key elements of the Municipal Code, including the City's **Phase I Water Supply Shortage Emergency Plan**, are outlined below.

We need our water customers and their families to follow these conservation measures and do their part to use water efficiently and avoid waste. To comply with the restrictions, the following measures must be followed:

 Watering of landscaping is permitted a maximum of three days per week and no more than 15 minutes per sprinkler station.

•	Monday night Tuesday morning	even
•	Tuesday night Wednesday morning	odd
•	Wednesday night Thursday morning	all off
•	Thursday night Friday morning	even
•	Friday night Saturday morning	odd
•	Saturday night Sunday morning	even
•	Sunday night Monday morning	odd

- Watering of landscaping must be done between the hours of 5 p.m. and 9 a.m. on designated days.
- Watering of outdoor landscaping in a manner that causes runoff is prohibited. This means no water can run off of your landscape and into the sidewalk, driveway or gutter.
- Water shall not be used to wash down sidewalks, hard or paved surfaces, including sidewalks, walkways, driveways and parking areas. Washing down such surfaces may occur when it is necessary to alleviate safety or sanitary hazards. In such cases the use of a hand-held bucket, a hand-held hose equipped with a positive self-closing water shut-off device, or a low-volume high-pressure water broom shall be used.
- Washing of vehicles should be kept to a minimum. When washing, a hose fitted with a self-closing water shut-off device is required.

Upcoming activities by the city to promote water conservation will include having a inspector visit neighborhoods to educate residents on the new measures and to help prevent overwatering.

If we are able to reduce water use now, we may not have to move to the more restrictive phases that include water allocations. The State Water Resources Control Board finds that an emergency exists due to severe drought conditions.

Let's all conserve water. Thank you for your cooperation as we all use water wisely.

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Fire prevention is everyone's responsibility

Fire safety is of the utmost importance. Please never forget that a fire in your home will not only damage your home, but will have a high probability of damaging your neighbors' homes as well.

Fire prevention is everyone's responsibility.

The number-one cause of fires within our community is stovetop fires. These fires primarily involve the kitchen stovetop (and

The clear majority of the cooking fires occur because of unattended cooking. With some know-how and the right equipment, your safety and the safety of your fellow shareholders/ members can be safer than ever

Hang around. Staying in the kitchen while cooking gives you a better chance of stopping potential fires from starting and of reacting quickly if they do. Avoid leaving the room to use the phone, watch TV or use the computer or leave to see a neighbor.

Never store anything combustible (fabric pot holders, towels, rags, paper food packaging, and so on) on or by the cook top or in the oven.

Know the oil's limits. Your electric range burners can reach temperature of over 1,000 degrees Fahrenheit; cooking oils can ignite when heated past 700 degrees Fahrenheit.

Many kitchen fires start when the cooking oil catches fire in the pan. To combat these fires, the National Fire Prevention Association recommends turning the knob to cut off the heat source and putting a lid over the fire to smother it.

Have a cover for that pan out ahead of time. Just in case there is a fire, you'll have it ready.

Use technology. You may forget to watch the stove constantly when the doorbell or phone rings.

There is an available device with built-in motion sensor that shuts the power off to your electric range if the device doesn't detect movement in a specific period

Retrofit Your Hood. Stovetop Firestop is a dry-chemical fire extinguisher in a can.

The 12-ounce cans use magnets to attach to the underside of your hood and release powder once a stove top fire's flames reach the FireStop. This device is very inexpensive and very effective.

Call for Help. DIYers know when a project is better off left to the pros, and the same logic extends to fire suppression.

Ask your building inspector if he can help you with the products available to help prevent fires.

Fires within our community are devastating and have had significant impact to maintenance assessments through increasing insurance costs directly related

Let's all work together to bring to an end of stovetop and kitchen fires that only you can prevent.

Fires and insurance coverage

The Foundation and mutuals do carry fire insurance; however, the individual responsible for causing the fire is financially responsible.

Fires within the community are directly attributed to increasing insurance rates and deductibles (current mutual fire insurance deductible is \$50,000). Adequate personal insurance such as an HO6 policy should be maintained by all shareholders and is strongly recommended.

Many shareholders are under the mistaken impression that the Foundation's and mutual's master insurance policy covers all damage to the interior of their unit as well as damage to furniture, appliances, etc.

That isn't so. In most cases, that master insurance policy covers common areas such as the building, and common areas, for both liability and physical damage but not the inside of units.

A HO-6 insurance policy therefore is essential to bridge the gap and provide coverage not included under the master policy, such as personal property, personal liability and loss assessment.

A unit owner must also be aware that he or she will be held responsible for any losses that cause damage outside of their unit that was caused by their negligence. A well-tailored HO-6 policy will protect you in this situation.

Coyote safety and our pets; shareholders must remain proactive

Coyote reports and activity have declined, but we must continue to be diligent working together through community unity and continue hazing. Many shareholders are still (and rightly so) concerned about coyote sightings and the consequences of predator animals within our community.

We must not forget several shareholders unfortunately have lost their beloved pets to these skilled hunters; we must be strong, motivated and most importantly

But what does being proactive mean? In short, proactive measures in coyote control mean:

- We must continue haze the coyotes
- We must not feed wildlife
- We must keep food and garbage off our patios
- We must protect our pets
- Small pets can easily become coyote prey. Cats and small dogs should never be allowed outside alone. It's highly recommended that small pets always be accompanied by their owner and dogs must be on a six-foot leash. A dog or cat left on a patio can be snatched in a matter of moments.

Listed below are some of the steps you can take to minimize encounters and potential conflicts between coyotes and your pets.

Cat safety

The only way of ensuring that your cat is safe from coyotes is to keep it indoors. The more time your cat is outdoors the greater the risk it faces, not only from coyotes, but also from hawks and owls.

Dog safety

- The most common conflict between coyotes and dogs is with smaller dogs. To ensure your pet is safe the best action is to supervise it at all times it is outside and make sure your pet is never off leash while outside of your home.
- There have been reports of coyotes taking small dogs from not only the direct vicinity of their owner, but directly off the leash. If you notice a coyote when walking your dog, quickly gather your dog in your arms if possible, or keep it as close to you as possible while using some of the hazing methods we have presented in earlier articles.
- Use a six-foot maximum length leash. You may want to see your dog scamper around on a long or retractable leash, but this is only placing your dog in harm's way and is a violation of policy.

How can I keep my small dog safe on leash?

As mentioned above there have been a few occasions when coyotes have taken small dogs directly from the leash. Coyote sightings may have declined but never assume that there may not still be coyotes in our community. In addition to the advice and deterrents mentioned previously, the following precautionary measures can be adopted to reduce the risk of injury to your pet:

• If you are uncomfortable making aggressive gestures or throwing objects at a coyote keep a shrill whistle handy when walking your dog (free whistles are available at The News office).

- The whistle may not scare the coyote directly (coyotes hear the same daily sirens, car alarms, horns etc. as we do), but it will alert other pedestrians in the area of your need for help.
- Don't use a retractable leash. Your dog can get too far away with a retractable leash. We've heard many stories of coyotes snatching a dog that strayed too far from its owner on a retractable leash. Walk your dog, on a six-foot leash.
 - Dog walk with a friend.

Make sure your dog is ahead of you while walking. If it stops to sniff or scratch behind you while on an extendable leash, keep an eye on it.

• Always be diligent.

Coyote safety reminders

- Do not leave food outside: Keep all pet food and water bowls indoors. Remove fallen fruit from trees. Do not leave your garbage cans out on patios.
- Bird feeders: Do not have bird feeders on your property. Bird food will attract rats, squirrels and rabbits which will attract covotes to your home.
- Carry a device that makes noise. Many people carry a bull horn or a coke can filled with pennies that they shake to make noise.

Coyote Approaches You: NEVER, UNDER ANY CIRCUMSTANCES, TURN YOUR BACK AND RUN. MAKE YOURSELF APPEAR TO LOOK **LARGER.** Wave your arms, scream, throw rocks! By running, you are seen as prey by the coyote.

Carry a walking stick or keep handy a noisemaker.

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
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
