We have just learned from Sqt. Bill Slenker That Bob was taken prisoner by the Germans on april 22, at which time he was well and in one piece. He must have learned his chute lessous well. Bill must have been with Cike, Prindroch and Bob at the time they were taken, as he knows that they lived on potatoes (not SPAM) for those 2/2 mouths of playing hide and reck. after all these months of chaning rainbows and ending up enty handed, we have finally hit pay dirt with word from the front. We have trad the Red From, adjt Geniel and Provort Marshall running down runnors for us, but without avail. as yet, they don't know of Bob's

My late Dad, while he lived, acted as go between with all the families of your crew. It here he received word of the fate of one of the boys, if the word were encouraging, he would pars it on to all others. In that way, a large family was born, bound to-gether in a common cause. I regret that he did not live to know that his sou still liver and that he, and not I, would be writing to you at this time. So again I say, Welcome bome, and may you and your family be happy in the great remnion. Way I have the privelege of hearing from you in the near future ? Hundly yours Etras. S. Beunger
